

Instrument Information

The Boge 513 is a modified anterior sickle/hoe scaler used to remove calculus in the dental prophylaxis process. This instrument is double ended, and is only available in sharpen-free XP Technology from American Eagle Instruments.



Due to the angulation of this instrument, it would be difficult to sharpen, so producing it in XP is significantly beneficial to the clinician.



One end of the Boge 513 has an elongated shank and straight, slightly lipped cutting edge. The hoe's width was specifically designed to maintain stabilization during vertical and horizontal working strokes.



The alternate end of the instrument is a Nebraska 128 sickle scaler.

Clinical Application



The anterior hoe is designed to scale:

- marginal recession areas with exposed root surfaces
- both the upper and lower anterior intraoral regions
- areas where patients have fixed orthodontic wires
- posterior areas with root surface exposure



The Nebraska 128 sickle scaler is designed to scale:

- interproximal contact areas
- areas with crowding and/or recession
